




ELA Update







Special Education Update (SPED)

Dear Families,

We celebrate a lot of awareness events for the month of March including the following events. Here is some information you may want to know.





- **Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month - #DDAwareness2023, #DDAM/, #DDAM2023, & #BeyondtheConversation**
 - **National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month (D.D.A.M.)**, observed throughout March, is a nationwide event to raise awareness about the inclusion of people with developmental disabilities and address the barriers that those with disabilities face. Inclusion is necessary since about 15% of the world's population lives with a disability. D.D.A.M. is about understanding the relationship between the way people function and how they participate in society and making sure everyone has the same opportunities in every aspect of life to the best of their abilities.
 - These are the [types of developmental disabilities](#) which include autism spectrum disorder (A.S.D.), cerebral palsy (C.P.), intellectual disability (I.D.), attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (A.D.H.D.), hearing loss, vision impairment, and Autism spectrum disorders.
 - Here is the [Resource Guide](#) for 2023 for you to use and deepen your knowledge on developmental disabilities.



- **Brain Injury Awareness Month - #MoreThanMyBrainInjury**
 - There are more than 5.3 million children and adults in the United States who are living with a permanent brain injury-related disability.
 - What is a **Brain Injury**?
 - An acquired brain injury (ABI) is an injury to the brain that is not hereditary, congenital, degenerative, or induced by birth trauma. Essentially, this type of brain injury is one that has occurred after birth. There are two types of acquired brain injuries: traumatic and non-traumatic.



- A traumatic brain injury (TBI) is defined as an alteration in brain function, or other evidence of brain pathology, caused by an external force or trauma. Traumatic impact injuries can be defined as closed (or non-penetrating) or open (penetrating).
- Brain injuries are complex and this information only scratches the surface. The BIAA website has lots of information on the various types of brain injuries, their effects, and more. Start your [brain injury education journey here](#).
- Did you know that every 9 seconds, someone in the United States sustains a brain injury? The lasting effects can be so severe they can impact a person's mood, personality, career and ability to function independently.

- **International Wheelchair Day - March 1st**
 - International Wheelchair Day is celebrated every March 1st for wheelchair users to celebrate the impact their wheelchair has had on their lives. In the U.S. alone, approximately 3 million people rely on a wheelchair every day. This day also serves as a reminder of the struggles faced by people who use wheelchairs and the need for society to make changes to accommodate their needs.



- **World Down Syndrome Day (United Nations Day) - March 21**

- World Down Syndrome Day is every year on **March 21st!** World Down Syndrome Day is a worldwide awareness day meant to celebrate individuals with Down syndrome by advocating for the rights, inclusion, and well-being of people with Down syndrome.
- **Down syndrome (or Trisomy 21)** is a condition in which a person has an extra chromosome. Chromosomes are “packages” of genes in the body. They determine how a baby’s body forms and functions as it grows. Around 1 in every 800 babies will be born with Down syndrome. Down syndrome occurs naturally – there is no known cause. Down syndrome usually causes varying degrees of intellectual and physical disability and associated medical issues.
- Every year, in [Massachusetts](#) the landmark Leonard Zakim Bunker Hill Memorial Bridge is lit up blue + yellow – the colors of Down syndrome!

HEALTH SERVICES UPDATE:

- The nurses are near completion of vision screenings and have sent out referral letters to many families for a comprehensive eye exam. We want to emphasize the importance of an annual exam by an eye doctor even if your child passed their screening at school. This year the MA Department of Public Health instructed school nurses to refer students with neurodevelopmental delays for a full eye exam since they are at a much higher risk of having a vision disorder. We are excited to announce that our partnership with [Codman Square Health Center](#) has offered us the convenience of exams and treatment right in Randolph at Eyecare Etc., 9 Warren Ave. by Optometrist Dr. Huynh.
